

Idaho Heritage Highlights

October 2013

We have been very busy at the Idaho Heritage Trust. In September the Board of Trustees Fall Tour took us to Lewiston and Moscow. We visited several preservation projects, viewed significant cultural artifacts and archaeological sites, learned from experts, and enjoyed a river trip up the Snake River into Hells Canyon. Some highlights follow below.

Also in September was the first statewide Idaho's Heritage Conference at the Idaho Statehouse in Boise. The Trust was a partner in the planning and organization of the Conference. More than 200 people attended from as far as Dubois to Sandpoint. Expert speakers in their fields of preservation, museums, and archaeology presented a wide range of topics. History and Archaeological Field Trips, an Idaho State Historical Museum Reception, and traditional Basque Dinner with the Oinkari Dancers were highlights. We were pleased to receive the results of a Participant Survey - 91% of the responders rated the conference as Very Good to Excellent. And 98% of the responders would like to see the Idaho's Heritage Conference as a re-occuring event. The Trust plans to support those requests.

St. Joseph's Mission

Mission Creek



The St. Joseph's Mission is located 4 miles south of Highway 95 on Mission Creek near Culdesac, Idaho. The oldest portion of the church which includes the Altar was originally constructed by Father Cataldo in 1874. In 1904 a front addition was added which included a small mezzanine and bell tower. The church was part of a much larger mission complex that included a day school operated by the Nuns and Sisters of the Catholic Church. The day school was lost in a fire several years ago.

St. Joseph's Mission is currently under private ownership and negotiations are underway with the owner and the National Park Service to establish an Memorandum of Understanding for the long term preservation of this historic building.

The Idaho Heritage Trust will be conducting a building assessment on behalf of the National Park Service and the owner to determine the stabilization and preservation needs.

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The Idaho Heritage Trust was pleased to be a partner in organizing and hosting the Idaho's Heritage Conference. Featuring field sessions, educational classes and cultural events, the Idaho Heritage Conference focused on education and networking to ensure history survives for future generations.

City Hall (Historic Federal Building and Post Office)

Moscow



Moscow Mayor Nancy Chaney, Nels Reese, Chair, Moscow Historic Preservation Commission and Associate Professor Emeritus of Architecture, University of Idaho along with city staff members provided a grand tour of the history and architecture of Moscow's City Hall.

The building was originally constructed as a Federal Building and Post Office in 1911 under the supervision of Architect James Knox Taylor. During his tenure as supervising Architect for the Federal Government 800 federal buildings were constructed. It was a period of great growth following the Civil War. Also during this time in history, architecture was dominated by the Beaux Arts movement. Simply stated it was the integration of sculpture, art, and architecture and a regenerated spirit with traditional styles. Elements of this style and illustrated in the Moscow City Hall include a raised first floor, grand entrances and staircases, arched windows, classical details, symmetry, and art.

Following the occupancy by the City Council and Administration, restoration of the building was completed in 1994. The building is one of the most beautiful public spaces in Moscow and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

Grant Submission Deadline September 30, 2013

The 2013 Grant Applications have been received and are in the process of review. The first step in the review process is a technical review with our Historical Architect and Conservator, Fred Walters and Tricia Canaday, Architectural Historian, State Historic Preservation Office. As technical experts they review the grant applications to ensure the proposed preservation work meets the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties. The next step is a Regional Committee Review. There are 7 Regional Committees located across the state. Finally, the Board of Trustees review all comments and award grants that fit within the Mission of the Trust to "preserve the

historic fabric of Idaho".
