n behalf of the Heritage Partners, I'd like to extend a big THANK YOU to all of the attendees at the first Idaho's Heritage Conference, and especially those who traveled great distances across our state to attend in Boise.

After the conference, we polled you to see what you thought, and the results are astounding. Of 60 respondents, 55 of you — 91.7 percent — rated the conference as "Excellent" or "Very Good."

The range of topics discussed relating to history, the variety of people speaking in sessions, and the expertise of the people presenting made the conference an excellent event."

More results from our poll:

- 98 percent of you say the Idaho's Heritage Conference should be an ongoing event, with 46 percent saying it should occur every two years
- 91 percent of you were Extremely Satisfied or Very Satisfied with the bus tours.

- 89.7 percent of you found the classroom subjects extremely or very interesting.
- 36 percent of attendees are in historic preservation; 30 percent are in museums; 16 percent archaeology and 14 percent are involved in general history. The remaining four percent are students or "other."
- 93 percent were extremely likely or very likely to recommend the conference to a friend.

Meeting people from the different regions and different venues gave me a chance to learn how others handled different problems. Finding these people are out there and willing to help was good news."

And we heard your feedback: Although many are happy with Boise as the host city, other attendees pointed out that the opportunities for field trips would expand and more people would be able to attend if the conference were moved to different locations throughout the state.

The Heritage Partners are soliciting communities that would be willing to host the Idaho's Heritage Conference in the future. Though the Heritage Partners remain dedicated to the conference, an event outside of Boise will necessitate the committed engagement of local partners to ensure its success.
