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# Canyon Creek Stage Stop, Main Oregon Trail

Mountain Home

The Archibald Daniel's family homesteaded and built the Canyon Creek Station in 1873. It was an important campsite providing travelers on the Oregon Trail, Overland Stage Route, and the Kelton Freight Road with food, shelter, and a safe place to rest their livestock. It was and is a valley of green grass and a meandering creek.

The station was built using hand forged lava rocks from the surrounding canyon and mortar with horsehair. The station operated until the death of Marion Daniels in 1921. An unfortunate fire destroyed the station in 1976 leaving only the exterior walls.

Without a roof, water has caused the station to further collapse.



The Norstebon family (current owners) have maintained the site and are committed to preserving it for the public. Encouraged by their engagement the Idaho Heritage Trust, the California-Oregon Trails Association Idaho Chapter, and the Bureau of Land Management are partnering to restore the station. Matching grants provided by the IHT and CA-OR Trails Association have enabled work to begin on the west wall. The goal is to reconstruct the walls and roof of the station. The station is one of two remaining stage stops and the only one with public access along the Main Route of the Trail.

IHT provides 50/50 matching grants for the preservation of Idaho's historic buildings, sites, and artifact collections.

### Campbell's Ferry Ranch

Main Salmon River

The discovery of gold near Monumental Creek in 1896 set off the Thunder Mountain Gold Rush. The miners traveled from Grangeville to Dixie, swam the Salmon River and packed through the Chamberlain Basin Wilderness to access a trail to Thunder Mountain. So in 1900 an enterprising William Campbell built a ferryboat to transport the miners and their stock across the river. Between 1900 and 1902, it is estimated that Campbell's Ferry transported nearly 1,800 miners.



Subsequent owners of Campbell's Ferry continued to

carry travelers until 1956. One of the infamous residents was Frances Zaunmiller Wisner who lived at the ranch from 1940 to 1986. For 40 years, she wrote a column for the Grangeville newspaper about life in the Idaho wilderness, which garnered national attention. In 1954 she promoted the construction of a pack bridge to replace the ferry through her column and a letter-writing campaign to Idaho Senators initiating enough pressure to insure approval and funding. In 1956, the US Forest Service built an airstrip to bring in the materials to construct the bridge which was officially named the "Frances Zaunmiller Wisner Memorial Pack Bridge".



Today Campbell's Ferry Ranch is surrounded by the Frank Church River of No Return Wilderness as well as the Nez Perce and Payette National Forests. Six of the original structures are listed on the National Register of Historic Places and are protected by a Scenic Conservation Easement. The Campbell's Ferry Partners (current owners) are committed to preserving and maintaining the ranch and the education of it's history for the public. The site is only accessible by plane, boat or by foot and is worth the effort as the experience is a treasure to never forget. And those who do are deeply grateful.
